How the Council spends its budget

£340million capital investment planned for the next five years

The Government places strict conditions on how capital funding can be spent. It cannot be used on day-to-day services but it can be spent on regeneration projects including new housing, roads and leisure facilities:

- Delivery of South Shields 365, the £100m town centre regeneration, which is well underway despite challenging financial and market conditions
- New and improved leisure facilities such as £3million investment in Jarrow Focus
- Major road improvements including £8.1million at the Arches
- New state-of-the-art £8.7million Toner Avenue primary school in Hebburn
- Bowman Street development in Whitburn, which is delivering a new £4.5m complex aimed at supporting independent living for elderly residents
- £2.5 million Monkton Flood alleviation scheme
- £3.8million to replace old bin lorry fleet


2019/20 Revenue budget of £124million

Revenue spending covers the day-to-day running costs of Council services, such as:

- Children's social care, fostering and adoption
- Care and support for vulnerable adults
- Bin collection and recycling
- Highways, parking, road and footpath maintenance
- Street cleaning
- Environmental health
- Parks, recreation, community facilities, libraries
- Benefits advice and administration
- Local transport services
- Street lighting

Almost 70% of the Council's discretionary budget is spent on services for vulnerable children and adults.

In addition, approximately £94million will be spent on education through South Tyneside schools.



Since 2010, we have worked hard to attract additional Government and external funding to finance our ambitions, securing a remarkable £1.6billion of public and private sector investment in our town centres, schools, housing, transport, coastal and urban regeneration.

The Council continues to invest to make South Tyneside a great place to live, invest and bring up families. There is a huge programme of investment underway across South Tyneside, including new and improved housing, modernised community and leisure facilities, economic growth projects, roads and footpaths investment, and so much more.

Roads

These transport investment projects aim to establish a strategic western gateway into South Tyneside and increase the capacity for economic growth across the Borough.

Investment in roads includes the £3.3million A19 lane gain, which provides an additional lane between Lindisfarne roundabout and the Jarrow A185 turnoff. This means that local traffic will not have to join queues for the Tyne Tunnel.

Further investment in roads includes £7.5million at Lindisfarne roundabout to reduce accidents, ease congestion and improve traffic flows in the area, as well as to alleviate the risk of flooding and £8.1million invested at the Arches


roundabout to alleviate congestion at the bottleneck junction of the A185 and A194. Completed in March 2019, the removal of the Arches and Hobson Way roundabouts has resulted in much freer flowing traffic.

Did you know?

In South Tyneside there are 600km of roads and 1,200km of footways.



CAF funded projects

Almost £1.5million is invested every year in CAF Grant schemes in projects across South Tyneside. Projects include improvements to roads and parking, footpaths, walls and fences.

Recent examples include the £35,000 Lincoln Road wall improvement programme, the £42,000 new parking bays at Burns Close to help make parking easier for residents and

the £27,000 Door Replacement programme for homes in Stewart Crescent and Fullwell Avenue.

Schools

South Tyneside children are taught in world-class education facilities following completion of the Transforming our Primary Schools (TOPS) and the Building Schools for the Future (BSF) programmes. The new £7million Toner Avenue Primary School,

Hebburn will open in September 2019, replacing the old 1961 Building.



Homes

South Tyneside Council is proactively shaping the local housing market to ensure that it meets the needs of all of our residents. Over £70million has been invested in affordable housing in the past five years.

During 2018-19, £65million of private investment went into delivering 436 new homes across South Tyneside.

South Tyneside Housing Ventures Trust, a not-for-profit company set up by the Council to provide new homes for people over 55, families living with someone with a disability, plus new and refurbished family and starter homes, delivered 65 new affordable homes

across four sites and secured £1,260,000 in external funding.

2018-19 also saw the completion of 118 new homes built by Bellway on the former South Tyneside College site (Hebburn Campus) Boldon Lane.



Energy efficiency

The Council's strategic vision and energy efficiency projects have reduced carbon emissions by 28% (from 19,216tonnes in 2015/16 to 13,746tonnes in 2017/18) and saved over £500,000 in the last three years across Council buildings.

Energy projects include a new boiler plant, improved heating systems and controls and LED lighting to reduce consumption and costs. These features are built into new building projects and major refurbishments such as Jarrow Hub and Hebburn Central.

Solar panels are already in place on 20 buildings, with more in the pipeline.

Investment of £1.5million in street lighting has resulted in the installation of LED lanterns on our high-energy-usage street lighting columns. So far, the Council has converted approximately 26% of columns, saving around £300,000 per year.

Regeneration projects

South Tyneside Council is creating the conditions for businesses to flourish, giving the private sector the confidence to invest here and providing residents with a high-quality built environment that we can all be proud of.

Major regeneration projects include South Shields 365, the Council and partners' sustainable economic vision to breathe new life into the heart of South Shields through new opportunities for residents, businesses and visitors, to create a vibrant town centre which will be a place of all-year-round cultural, leisure and retail activity.

With Phase Two well underway, work on the £21million South Shields Transport Interchange is on track to open in advance of The Great North Run on 8 September (read more on page 7).

Investment into Holborn includes a welcoming ferry landing, Harton Quays Park and new business accommodation, attracting blue-chip employer BT. The Council has been working behind-the-scenes on the next stage of the vision to transform the disused docks and surrounding brownfield land into a vibrant riverside location for high-quality offices, housing and a cultural offer.



The International Advanced Manufacturing Park (IAMP) is a joint venture between Sunderland and South Tyneside Councils. IAMP will be located in the area north of Nissan UK's Sunderland car plant, close to the A19 and will be a high-quality strategic employment site for the Nissan supply chain and other advanced manufacturing businesses, attracting national and overseas investment.

It is expected that over the next 10 to 15 years, IAMP will support more than £400million of private sector investment, creating over 7,000 jobs.

IAMP has already been designated a 'Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project' by UK Government, which has pledged £42million through the North East LEP towards infrastructure including new roads, bridges and environmental enhancements to support the development.

Construction on the first phase, IAMP ONE, is now underway with handover of the first factory due in summer 2019.



Flood risk schemes

Around 100 homes and businesses in Monkton are now better protected from flooding following £2.5million of investment. Flood defences were put in place in the areas of Monkton Burn, Lukes Lane Estate and the Leam Lane area, Mill Lane, Lilac Walk, College Road, Campbell Park Road, Thirlmere Court and Mountbatten Avenue.



A further £8.5million will be invested by Northumbrian Water at The Nook and Cleadon Park in 2020 and will have a long-term benefit to householders and businesses across the area. Read more about flood alleviation on page 9.

Leisure and libraries

The way that people use leisure and library facilities is changing and we must change with them. We are committed to delivering affordable, sustainable, modern and efficient multi-purpose facilities with services that meet the changing needs of our residents, create resilience for future generations and support our economic vision to create new opportunities for residents, businesses and visitors.

Hebburn Central is a £12.8million state-of-the-art community hub in Hebburn, serving as a leisure and library facility and a community venue. Since opening in June 2015 it has had over 840,000 visits.

Together with investment in Hebburn Central and private sector investment in housing, the masterplan for Hebburn Town Centre is coming to fruition, with a new supermarket and improvements to public areas.



The £3million transformation of the former Jarrow Community Centre, Jarrow Focus, features a redesigned gym, sports hall, dance studios, theatre space and library. Since opening it has had over 11,500 visits.

The Word, National Centre for the Written Word, has welcomed more than one million visitors. Since it opened, in October 2016, people from across the UK and beyond have enjoyed the South Shields venue, borrowing books, visiting exhibitions and taking part in an ever-changing programme of events and workshops.

The Word is part of the £100million regeneration of South Shields Town Centre.



Work on interchange is on track

Construction of the new South Shields Transport Interchange is on schedule to open in advance of the Great North Run on 8 September, allowing thousands of residents and visitors through the new gateway to get a glimpse of what's to come in South Shields as part of the town centre regeneration masterplan.

The £21million project, which forms Phase Two of the masterplan, will bring together a modern bus station and relocated Metro station.

Work on the eye-catching building is progressing at pace, with the roofing and copper shingle cladding complete and final internal work continuing over the coming months.

Highway works and preparations for the final phase of the rail works will also continue, as will construction of the bus concourse.

Lifts, escalators, fixtures and fittings and passenger information boards will be installed ahead of the station opening.

The Council is working with partners Muse Developments, Nexus and construction contractor Bowmer and Kirkland to deliver the project.

Updates:

- Highway works to Crossgate and Westoe Road are substantially complete. Isolated areas of resurfacing will be carried out once diversion work is completed by utility providers
- There will be a temporary line closure to South Shields Metro Station in early July for four weeks to allow the final phase of rail works to be carried out. Visit www.nexus.org.uk for updates and alternative travel arrangements
- When the new interchange is operational, the bus stands on Keppel Street will be removed to allow further work to be carried out to the highway and public realm areas. This work will continue in to 2020
- Demolition of the existing Metro station is scheduled to start before the end of the year following the opening of the new interchange.

What's next for 365?

Following completion of Phase One, Phase Two is well underway with the interchange opening soon and work to the surrounding areas following later this year and into 2020. This will mark another key milestone in the regeneration of South Shields Town Centre and serve as a platform to support the next stage of our 365 Masterplan. The Council is currently working with development partner Muse on proposals for new retail and family leisure facilities, including a cinema.

As a result of 365, further investment in South Shields has been made by NEXUS, who are currently constructing their new Skills Academy in the town centre.

Traffic works in South Tyneside 2019



A19 additional lane northbound

Work has started to provide an additional lane to the A19 northbound, between the A19/A194 Lindisfarne roundabout and the Jarrow A19/A185 junction to the south of the Tyne Tunnel.

The work is being managed by South Tyneside Council, and carried out by the Council's highway construction framework partner, GallifordTry.

Aims

The purpose of the additional lane is to:

- **Help reduce journey time on the A19 northbound and the local network** - The extra lane will mean vehicles which want to leave the A19 via the Jarrow turn off won't need to stay in any queue of vehicles waiting to travel north through the tunnel. These vehicles, as well as any travelling from Lindisfarne roundabout, will be able to stay in the new dedicated lane.
- **Reduce congestion** - The removal of non-tunnel traffic from the A19 northbound approach to the Tyne Tunnel will help reduce queue lengths and journey times for both the A19 traffic and for vehicles on the local road system.
- **Improve air quality** through the improved traffic flows.



* Approximate timeline

Late May / early June 2019 - During this time there will be one overnight closure, from 8pm to 6am on a weekday. There will be a fully signed diversion route.

Start of October 2019 - Two weeks' of overnight closures from 8pm to 6am on weekdays. There will be a fully signed diversion route.

Mid October 2019 - Scheduled completion of work.

Monkton Flood Alleviation Scheme

The scheme started in March 2018 and is now coming to an end.

Severe flooding hit the area back in 2012 on a day now known as 'Thunder Thursday'. The floods caused havoc in the area, affecting transport and hundreds of properties across South Tyneside. As part of the Council's ongoing work to make South Tyneside more flood resilient a flood alleviation scheme was developed in Monkton.

We have been working closely with residents, businesses and schools in the area throughout the scheme. As part of the completion celebrations St. Joseph's Catholic Academy is developing household emergency flood plans, which will be distributed in the area. These plans will include the importance of water safety around the new day-lighted culvert, other

parts of the scheme that are designed to store water and slowly allow it to filter down into the soil after heavy rain storms.

A video is being made with schools in the area with local pupils talking about the scheme. The video looks at what the pupils learnt about being resilient to flooding, how studying science, technology and maths could help them into a career in flood risk management. The video will be launched at a celebration event of the scheme and will then be available to watch on the Council website. This event will also reveal what the new day-lighted culvert will be named – local schools have been asked to submit their suggestions.

UNIVERSAL CREDIT

Are you prepared?

Full roll out of Universal Credit in South Tyneside began in May 2018 and there are an increasing number of people claiming in the Borough. It may impact on you. This means that if you claim one of the benefits below and have a change in circumstances, you may move onto Universal Credit. People who have not moved to the new benefit will follow sometime around 2020.

The seven-day waiting period has been removed, meaning households are getting paid quicker.



Our Welfare Support team is here to help you with benefit and debt issues

Universal Credit is a single monthly payment for people in and out of work. It replaces six benefits:

- HOUSING BENEFIT
- CHILD TAX CREDIT
- INCOME SUPPORT
- WORKING TAX CREDIT
- INCOME-BASED JOBSEEKER'S ALLOWANCE
- INCOME-RELATED EMPLOYMENT AND SUPPORT ALLOWANCE

The Citizen's Advice Bureau (CAB) is now contracted by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) to run the 'Help to Claim' service to support people moving over to Universal Credit, including benefit checks, digital support to claim and budgeting advice.

You can claim a Department for Work and Pensions benefit via the Government's website www.gov.uk/apply-universal-credit There are a number of free access PCs across the Borough. Find out where you can access public PCs and receive support at www.southtyneside.gov.uk/getonline

Council's Skills Service helps uncle and nephew duo find employment

Gordon Austin and his nephew, Michael White, have both found jobs after completing a Digital Confidence course delivered by Northern Rights.

The course, which is funded by South Tyneside Council's Skills Service, covers basic IT skills, accessing and using the internet as well as how to use IT to help find work.

The course and additional support Michael received helped him to overcome a number of barriers to getting into work which included having a learning difficulty and lacking confidence. As well as improving his digital skills Michael also received support to create a CV, improve his job search and interview skills, and develop his Maths and English.

Michael wanted to work in retail and said: "The course helped me gain confidence and Northern Rights helped me get a two week 'Tesco Launch' placement at the Tesco Simonside store where I was able to show the skills and abilities I'd learned on my course."

The store manager found a role for Michael and he has worked for Tesco since September 2018.

Gordon said: "Prior to starting the Digital Confidence course I was volunteering as a retail assistant in a local charity shop. I chose this course because I wanted to improve my computer skills to do better job applications.

"I found the course really useful. Everyone was really friendly and I'm much more confident using a computer now. The course has also improved my confidence working in group situations."

Since completing his course, Gordon has progressed into part time employment as a kitchen assistant at The Customs House. Head Chef, Gary France, said: "Gordon is really enjoying his work and is doing very well. We are happy with his progress and are giving him additional hours where possible. He is more confident and has a bright future ahead of him."


THE BIGGEST CARNIVAL OF ITS KIND IN THE NORTH EAST



THE WORD GETS THE BALL ROLLING TO PROMOTE LITERACY...

Pupils from six schools involved in the project with the former Mayor and Mayoress of South Tyneside, Ken Stephenson and Mrs Cathy Stephenson, alongside local writer, James Whitman, and players and representatives from South Shields Football Club.

Youngsters from South Tyneside have been given the opportunity to get involved in an innovative project at The Word.

The project, which aimed to promote literacy through sport, saw 60 pupils from 10 schools across the Borough taking part in a special six-month scheme where they turned their enthusiasm for football to literacy skills and report writing.

The initiative – a partnership between The Word, South Shields Football Club, South Tyneside Libraries and OpenZone – kicked off in November and since then the youngsters – all aged between nine and 11 – have watched a South Shields FC match and taken part in a series of writing workshops at The Word.

The children involved have been able to take their passion for sport and turn it into a fun way to develop their literacy skills by working with a fantastic local writer, James Whitman. They also had the opportunity to interview players from the club and record their reports in The Word's very own Media Studio which boasts state-of-the-art recording



equipment, sound booth, green screen and autocues – everything a budding reporter needs!

The project, funded by asset management company Mirabaud, a sponsor of The Word, has managed to engage youngsters from South Tyneside with the written word.

To celebrate the end of the project, pupils and teachers from local schools were invited to The Word for a special event with the former Mayor and Mayoress of South Tyneside, Ken Stephenson and Mrs Cathy Stephenson. The youngsters were able to see a screening of their reports, enjoy a quiz with the players from the football club and further develop their literacy and communication skills by conducting and filming interviews with each other about how they enjoyed being a part of the project.

Helping people to live better lives

A South Tyneside woman is enjoying a new lease of life thanks to the Council's fresh approach to adult social care.

Mrs A experienced a number of health problems for some time which meant her mobility and ability to stand was very compromised and she was mainly cared for in bed.

When John, our Social Work Assistant first met her, she was feeling very negative and, due to recurring infections, was unable to engage in any physiotherapy. She was also reluctant to use a hoist which would have helped to improve her quality of life.

However, by having a different type of conversation, John was able to work with her in a more person centred way. By arranging for her to spend some time in a residential setting and working with the multi-disciplinary team, her health

improved which meant she was able to participate in physiotherapy.

After 14 weeks in the care setting, she was then able to go home where she now uses a stand aid to get out of bed and is able to take part in her favourite activities. She is also planning to get a wheelchair to enable her to get out and about in the community.

Mrs A said: "My quality of life has improved dramatically since working with the social care team at the Council. I feel I have two birthdays now – my real one and another which marks the day when my social worker started to work with me as I feel that my life started over from that day."

By working in a more person-centred way and using a Let's Talk Together approach, staff work with individuals and focus on their strengths and resources within the community to help people live better lives. By working more intensively with people and focusing on what is important to them, advice and support can be offered to maximise independence.

Direct Payments



A direct payment is one of the ways you can receive money from the Council to help you pay for the care and support you need. Choosing to have a direct payment gives you more control over the services you use and where you get them from.

If you have eligible social care needs, such as needing help to prepare meals, looking after your personal hygiene or getting out and about, you will be allocated a personal budget. You can talk to your social care assessor about the benefits of a direct payment to determine whether a direct payment is right for you.

You can choose to receive all, or part, of your personal budget as a direct payment so that you can buy services or pay someone to support you.

You can spend your direct payment on any services as long as they are legal, keep you safe and healthy, and meet your eligible needs. The Council will pay your direct payment into an individual pre-paid card.

Direct payments do not count as income and will not affect your benefits.



Can I get a direct payment?

You can get a direct payment if:

- You have eligible social care needs
- You can make decisions for yourself
- You ask for a direct payment
- You can manage a direct payment alone or with help
- It will help to meet your eligible needs

If you cannot make decisions, you can still get direct payments if a family member, carer or friend is willing to manage your direct payment for you.

You may have to pay for some of your care and support depending on your financial circumstances. A financial assessment will be completed to decide this.

What are the benefits of a direct payment?

A direct payment can help you to live more independently. It gives you more flexibility, control and choice than if your support is arranged for you by the Council.

It is your choice if you want to have a direct payment, and you may be unsure whether you want to or can manage it.

In these cases, the Council can provide you with a combination of payments.

A combination of payments may consist of a smaller direct payment, with some care and support arranged by your council or a provider. This allows you to try out direct payments before deciding whether to move to a 'full' direct payment.

Adult Social Care launches new guide to self-care for carers

Adult Social Care has launched a new guide to encourage carers to take care of themselves. 'Taking Care of You' is to help carers identify the right kind of information and support they need to help them care safely and effectively. It will also help carers to think about their own health and wellbeing and identify areas where they may need help through completion of a wellbeing check.

The guide will be available in most public buildings or at your GP surgery and you can request a copy from South Tyneside Adult Carer's Service.

Adult Social Care is working with employers to raise the profile of working carers and to help carers to stay in work

Many of us will be a carer at some stage in our lives. The role can come about unexpectedly and many of us will find ourselves trying to juggle full or part time employment alongside our caring role, however this can lead to difficulties, leaving many of us reaching crisis point and feeling that we have no choice but to leave or change our jobs.



Adult Social Care is encouraging employers to support working carers by introducing carer friendly practice and policies into their organisations. This has benefits for both the employer and employee, helping to reduce absenteeism, reduce staff turnover and increase productivity. It can also help employees feel valued and supported as well as improving work-life balance.



Exploitation – if you see it, report it

Exploitation is the deliberate maltreatment, manipulation or abuse of power and control over a child or another adult. It usually involves taking advantage of another person or situation for personal gain. Perpetrators select their victims because more often than not, they are vulnerable in some way.

Exploitation has many forms, including:

- sexual violence and abuse
- slavery
- being controlled by a person or a group (gang or peers)
- forced labour
- domestic violence and abuse
- human trafficking
- financial
- criminal /county lines



Exploitation is a form of ABUSE, is NOT ACCEPTABLE and doesn't stop just because you reach the age of 18

Friends Against Scams

South Tyneside Council has recently registered with the National Trading Standards Scams Team as a 'Friends Against Scams Organisation'.

This means that the Council is committed to spreading the word about scam awareness amongst colleagues and residents with emphasis on reaching out to the most vulnerable in South Tyneside.

Officers from Trading Standards have been carrying out presentations to all Community Area Forum meetings to highlight different types of scams, such as postal, telephone, email and text message as well as providing practical tips to combat doorstep crime. Those attending a presentation receive a certificate confirming that they are a 'Friend Against Scams'.

In South Tyneside, we have 15 No Cold Calling Zones (NCCZ) across the Borough with more being planned for the future. NCCZs act as a deterrent to unwanted doorstep callers who may target our most elderly and vulnerable residents.

Shops in the Borough have shown a responsible approach to selling knives following a series of successful test purchases.


Throughout the month of March, Trading Standards and Northumbria Police carried out a joint initiative which saw a number of child volunteers, under the supervision of both agencies, tasked with purchasing knives from a total of 20 stores around the North East. Seven of those stores were in South Tyneside where traders correctly identified the underage shoppers and refused the sales.

IT'S OKAY NOT TO BE OKAY

Let's work together to stop mental health stigma in South Tyneside

South Tyneside Youth Health Ambassadors is a group of volunteers aged 14-17. The ambassadors have been trained to undertake inspections of health services, to offer information and advice to their peers and to run their own health campaigns.

The ambassadors designed a set of resources aimed at reducing stigma around mental health. The aim of their campaign was to start conversations, spread key messages about mental health and encourage young people who are struggling to speak out about how they feel and get appropriate support.

The ambassadors worked with schools in South Tyneside so that pupils knew where to get support and who to talk to about reducing stigma. They

encouraged other young people to break down the mental health stigma.

Public Health undertook an assessment of children and young people's mental health services across South Tyneside. Young people said that they didn't feel very connected to their local services and there were perceived barriers to accessing the services. This meant young people weren't accessing timely support.

The three main roles of the Young Health Ambassadors include:

- Running their own health campaigns
- Training for formal and informal self-care.
- Working with health services in the area to remove barriers for young people to access health services.



The ambassadors even changed national messages to make them relatable to young people. The young people decided on what they wanted to get involved with and what they didn't. The ambassadors act as advocates for their peers to make health services better for young people in South Tyneside.

This is done by encouraging sign up to the Better Health at Work Award. There is evidence that good health at work improves people's wellbeing and quality of life.

The Better Health at Work Award recognises the efforts of employers in addressing health issues within the workplace. The scheme is FREE, flexible and open to all employers in the North East and Cumbria.

Since 2016 we have more than tripled the number of companies achieving the Better Health at Work status with 21 award achievers for 2018. There are four levels to the Award Bronze, Silver, Gold and Continuing Excellence. Organisations are given up to a year per level, but there is flexibility for those who need it. Every employer/organisation who signs-up to participate in the Award scheme is supported by a dedicated Workplace Health Improvement Specialist. South Tyneside Council achieved the Silver level in 2018 and is working towards the Gold level.

Some of the fantastic work done by other employers in the Borough includes:

- Tynecoast College supporting the links between workplace health and building capacity amongst individuals and communities.
- Cell Pack Solutions' were selected to present their innovative BHAWA work at the North East Public Health Conference.
- StageCoach South Shields implemented a Slimming World class in their depot. One of the bus drivers lost three stones in weight and now the Slimming World consultant has won a UK Bus Health Champion Award.

- Legal Aid Agency promoted a physical activity week for those who would not normally participate in exercise.

Smoking causes 16 cancers – quitting is a clear way to reduce your risk



South Tyneside Council is supporting a campaign urging smokers to quit and reduce their risk of cancer.



The Quit 16 campaign from Fresh was re-launched on 3 June, supported by Cancer Research UK, and highlights that smoking causes 16 different types of cancer, as well as the many benefits of quitting. Smokers can visit www.Quit16.co.uk to get started.

It is estimated that smoking causes over 44,100 new cases of cancer and over 36,000 deaths from cancer a year in England. Although most smokers have heard of lung cancer, smoking also causes heart disease, COPD, stroke, dementia and diabetes.

Local Stop Smoking Services can provide smokers with free and effective support to stop smoking.

Besides lung cancer, smoking also causes cancers of the mouth, nasal cavities, pharynx and larynx, stomach, kidney, bowel, liver, pancreas, cervix, bladder and ovaries, oesophagus and ureter, as well as myeloid leukaemia. There is also some evidence that smoking could cause breast cancer.

QUIT

5 Tips for quitting

- Consider using Nicotine Replacement Therapy, such as patches and gum as a quit aid.
- Local Stop Smoking Services provide expert advice, support and encouragement to help you stop smoking for good.
- Some people do manage to quit first time – but for many it takes more than one attempt. Don't get disheartened if you didn't quit first time, and don't tell yourself you can't do it.
- Get support from family and friends
- Research suggests the best chance of success is by stopping abruptly rather than by trying to cut down gradually.

Stroke service changes are saving lives



39-year-old Claire Challoner of South Shields (pictured with members of the team) credits the new service with saving her life after she suffered a stroke while shopping at The Nook in May 2018.

"It was the most terrifying experience of my life but from the moment I arrived at Sunderland Royal Hospital I felt I was in safe hands," she says.

"The attention to detail from everyone - consultants, nurses and healthcare assistants - was fantastic. I was very lucky I had them looking after me and the million little personal touches made all the difference to a traumatic experience."

More patients in South Tyneside are getting high quality stroke care and life-saving treatment, thanks to recent changes to the service.

Since inpatient stroke care was centralised at Sunderland Royal Hospital in December 2016 (initially on a temporary basis), there have been major improvements in outcomes for South Tyneside stroke patients.

70% of South Tyneside patients are now receiving a CT scan within one hour – it was just 22% before the changes. 85% of eligible patients are now receiving vital clot-busting drugs

(thrombolysis), compared to just 9% in 2016.

By concentrating teams of stroke consultants and therapy specialists into one unit, we are now able to scan, assess and admit stroke patients to a dedicated acute stroke unit far quicker.

Dr Matthew Walmsley, a local GP and Chair of NHS South Tyneside Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) said: "These results clearly demonstrate the vast improvements in clinical care for our patients in South Tyneside. This could not have happened without making difficult changes to strengthen the pool of stroke experts we now have readily available to care for our patients 24/7."

BE AWARE OF MATE CRIME

Mate crime occurs when a person is harmed or taken advantage of by someone they thought was their friend.

Some people pretend to be your friend and then they can start to be nasty, say hurtful things, take things from you and bully you into doing things you do not want to do.

There are different types of mate crime:

THEFT/FINANCIAL ABUSE: The abuser might demand or ask to be lent money and then not pay it back. The perpetrator might misuse the property of the vulnerable adult.

PHYSICAL ASSAULT/ABUSE: The abuser might hurt or injure the vulnerable adult.

HARASSMENT OR EMOTIONAL ABUSE: The abuser might manipulate, mislead and make the person feel worthless.

SEXUAL ASSAULT/ABUSE: The abuser might harm or take advantage of the person sexually.

Improved housing service helps people find the right home for them

The Housing Solutions Service at South Tyneside Homes has achieved some amazing results to reduce the number of empty council homes in South Tyneside, help people find the right home for them and to help communities thrive.

During the past year, almost 4,000 applicants have benefited from the service after applying to join our housing register.

Our new Housing Options outreach service provides advice and support to customers in the greatest need, and has helped more than 1,300 customers who are homeless or at risk of being homeless in the past year.

The Health and Housing Support team has helped almost 350 customers move to more suitable accommodation. The team has also helped many more customers make suitable adjustments to allow them to remain in their current homes.

New processes are in place to help customers maintain their new tenancies and provide pre-tenancy support to those who need it.

To use resources more effectively, members of the Empty Homes Construction team has received additional training so they are more multi-skilled and can carry out more repairs to a high standard. As a result, the routine repair process in empty homes takes just 13 days on average.

When it comes to allocating homes, the team has listened to feedback from

customers. It has made signing up to a tenancy and allocation of homes more accessible and has focused on different ways to market and let homes to better engage with the community.

Thanks to improvements within the service the number of empty homes in South Tyneside has fallen by 40%, the number of homes that are ready to let has fallen by more than 50% and the average time properties have been empty has been reduced by 50% since January 2018.
