MEET THENEW SOUTH TYNESIDE CABINET

The Council Constitution requires that the Leader appoints a Cabinet, including a Deputy Leader.

Our South Tyneside

When it comes to the regeneration of our area, South Tyneside Council is listening to you. Over the last decade, right across the Borough, we've invested in projects to drive footfall to our town centres - and now we want to talk to you about the next decade and beyond.

While the Council does not own the Mountbatten Centre, we used the land we do own to provide a modern facility to attract people to the town at Hebburn Central. This has inspired wider retail confidence with new stores. More recently, we've brought pop up food markets, which have proven incredibly popular with the people of Hebburn as well as existing business owners

In Jarrow, we delivered the new Jarrow Focus, which has state of the art facilities. The Council does not own the Viking shopping centre, but we have invested in public realm, creating green space to the east of Jarrow Focus, as well as improving Jarrow Riverside Park which leads visitors to Jarrow Hall, housing a modern café, adjacent to the improved Council-owned play park facilities.

In South Shields, we delivered improvements to the Market, including The Word library and

tourist attraction. We created Harton Quay Park providing a high quality


arrival to the town from the ferry, as well as improvements along

Ocean Road to guide people to and from the foreshore.

We delivered a new transport interchange to attract visitors to revitalised parks, foreshore and Haven Point Leisure facility.

We know that Town Centres are changing. You know they are too, and we listen when you give your views. However, our conversation must be based on facts. The Council can't reduce business rates for shops - these are

set by Central Government. The Council can't reduce shop rents – we don't own the shop buildings.







The Council can't transform the South Shields Gasometer into a department store – we don't own the gasometer and we simply don't have that kind of funding.

A decade ago, the South Shields 365 masterplan set out an ambition for a new supermarket and a cinema to drive footfall. A decade on and a range of socio-economic factors means these are no longer viable. The pandemic led to much greater numbers of people turning to online shopping and much of our leisure economy is still recovering. There remains limited prospect that the private sector will commit to this scale of investment in the short-term.



However, we want to talk to you about what we can do.

The Council can use our influence to seek and secure future investors – to shop retailers, leisure owners and beyond. We've been doing that with local education partners and hope that soon we can formally communicate plans for investment in South Shields Town Centre. When we do, we want to hear from you, our residents, as well as our younger residents whose education is ahead of them and who will be uniquely placed to shape the future place they want to use.


We want to collect a range of opinions and ideas to connect your voice to investors when they are looking at places to invest. From pop up markets, open air music and performance, public art to green space.

South Tyneside's Local Plan

What is the Local Plan?

The Local Plans address the needs and opportunities of residents in relation to housing, the economy, community facilities and infrastructure. It also acts as a basis for protecting and enhancing the natural environment, adapting to climate change and securing good design.

Why does South Tyneside need one?

Local Plans are a statutory requirement and are the starting point for guiding decisions about individual development proposals and are used for planning applications.

What would happen if we didn't produce one?

Without an up-to-date Local Plan, South Tyneside could be subject to speculative development proposals. There's also a risk that if we fail to produce an up-to-date Local Plan, Central Government may intervene and take over the writing of the Local Plan. This would mean we'd have no control over what development is imposed on South Tyneside.

What are the aims of South Tyneside's Local Plan?

Our vision for the Local Plan can be broadly defined into 6 key objectives:

- ✓ Building a stronger local economy
- ✓ Regenerating the Borough
- ✓ Meeting the needs for new homes
- ✓ Tackling climate change
- ✓ Delivering an environmentally sustainable borough
- ✓ Promoting positive healthy choices

How will the Local Plan meet the needs of local people?

The Local Plan is central to meeting the current and future needs of all members of our community.


We want to make sure young people, have access to affordable housing and skilled jobs within the Borough. Policies within the Local Plan seek to deliver new affordable homes across the Borough and support new jobs and businesses, so that South Tyneside is an attractive place to live, work and invest in.


We want to ensure we meet the needs of an ageing population through delivering new easy access homes, sheltered/supported housing, and wheelchair accessible homes. The Local Plan also supports policies which seek to improve the health and wellbeing of its residents by delivering high quality, accessible and safe environments.

The Local Plan aims to provide excellent community facilities – new schools, medical centres, shops and roads – all of which will support thriving communities.

What about the impact on our natural environment?

Any new development is likely to have some impact upon our natural environment, whether the development site is brownfield or Green Belt. The Local Plan has a statutory duty to protect our most valuable and sensitive environmental assets;; these will continue to be protected through existing environmental designations (e.g. Local Wildlife Sites, Sites of Special Scientific Interest, etc).

What are the next steps?

After the consultation closes, responses will be recorded, summarised and published on the website. The findings of the consultation will be formulated into a report that will be published and used to inform the next stage of plan preparation.

Who will make the final decision on South Tyneside's Local Plan?

The final decision on the Local Plan and the development it proposes will be made by the independent Planning Inspector, appointed by the Government, following the examination. The Council will then need to make the formal decision





Businesses pledge support for a better Borough

1 More Than 2 Brew Co. Founder Chris Donovan

More than 100 organisations have signed up to the South Tyneside Pledge, to help create a thriving future for the Borough.

Launched in the New year, the pledge sets out nine commitments for organisations to spend, recruit and support South Tyneside with the aim of boosting local economic activity, cut carbon emissions, and enhance civic pride for the benefit of the whole Borough.

By signing up to the charter, organisations can collectively bring about positive change.

1 More Than 2 Brew Co. in Portberry Street, South Shields, has signed up to the pledge.

The first 'community brewery' in South Tyneside opened in September 2020 and prides itself on its partnerships with other independent businesses in the borough and wider region. Founder Chris Donovan has a firm belief in showcasing fellow South Tyneside businesses and ultimately keeping money within the local economy.

The Brewery works in partnership with South Shields Football Club as the sole provider of real ale at Mariners Park and has teamed up with Colman's to create the 1926 Blonde Ale, available exclusively at their restaurants.



They're supporting the third sector too: to commemorate the fifth anniversary of the Manchester bombings, they've created a Chloe and Liam Foundation-branded beer, raising the charity's profile and with all profits going to the Foundation.

Chris and his team hold a monthly business guiz so that organisations of all sizes can meet and network in a relaxed environment. The agenda is focused on what they can do to help each other and with an average of 18 teams each month, it is an excellent way to collaborate.

The brewery has also taken on a new starter through the Kickstart Scheme, which was put in place to create jobs for 16- to 24-year-olds on Universal Credit who are at risk of long-term unemployment.

Chris said:

"It's important that we include the community to ensure we continue with our original philosophy of brewing beer South Tyneside can be proud of. Local partnerships and collaborations are also paramount to business success, and we are proud to champion our area and the wonderful businesses within it.

"Our whole ethos is that the Brewery becomes an institution that kickstarts new businesses and ideas, and allows the local community to dream a little bigger."

As part of ambitious growth plans, the brewery has diversified into events and has supported others into business.

Helping older people to retain their independence living better lives



Supporting older people and vulnerable communities is one of the Council's priorities.

Over recent months a number of measures have been taken to help older people retain their independence. This in line with the Council's 'home-first' approach to adult social care following feedback from residents who said they wanted to live well at home rather than go into residential care

Twelve empty flats in Thomas Bell House – a sheltered housing facility in South Shields - are being used to accommodate people coming out of hospital while 24/7 care on site allows them to benefit from additional support before going back home. Previously, without the right type of support and accommodation, some people were being discharged from hospital straight into a care home which could impact upon their independence and skills.

Blenkinsop Court in South Shields has also been converted from a Housing Plus to an Extra Care scheme with a care and support team on site 24 hours a day. The support means that fewer people will have to go into residential care.

One resident who now lives there is 97-year-old Doris Dawson who lived in her own home until two years ago when she had a stroke.


Her daughter-in-law, Lesley Dawson, said: "Doris is thriving in Blenkinsop Court. She has company when she wants it and it's massively important to us that she is keeping her independence.



Top marks for service which helps people live independently

A service which helps more than 3,000 South Tyneside people live independently has been assessed as top quality.



The Council's Living Better Lives
Technology and Independence service
has just been accredited by the Quality
Standards Framework. The audit
means that users can be assured that
the assistive technology offered by
the Council is safe and effective and
is further evidence that the Council is
delivering on its priority of supporting
older and vulnerable communities.

The service offers a range of equipment to help people live independent lives in their own home. This includes alarm pendants and panic buttons which can be used to raise the alarm in the event of a fall, sensors that monitor how long people have been away from their bed or chair, pill dispensers with sounds and visual alerts to remind people to take their medication and GPS tracking for

people with memory impairment who may wander away from their home.

One person who uses assistive technology is South Tyneside resident Peter Marshall. Peter, 84, has dementia and is prone to falls. He has had fall and doors sensors installed at his home at the Lawe Top in South Shields which alert his son, Tim, when he leaves his home. A GPS tracker also means his family know where he is when he is outside.

Tim, who lives at The Nook in South Shields, said:

"Dad always wanted to stay in his own home and telecare allows him to do just that. We feel he is safe at home and it's the best place for him."

New support for South Tyneside's retiring generation



A new service to connect those in South Tyneside aged 65+ to the people, activities and services they may need as they move into a new phase of their lives is to launch.

A Future You aims to support people around retirement age and beyond to stay connected to the things they enjoy doing, develop new interests, be active and age well by:

- Connecting them to activities, events and groups they may be interested in
- Preventing ill health by understanding the positive things they can do to stay socially, emotionally and cognitively well
- Maintaining their quality of life through ageing well services

Dedicated advisors will listen to each person's needs and interests, before signposting them to the right services and activities.

Support for care leavers praised by ofsted



Ofsted inspectors have praised South Tyneside Council's Children's Services for the support they give to young people leaving care.

Following a focused visit, inspectors agreed that "dedicated and committed workers" support young people and prepare them to leave care extremely well

They found most of the young people supported by the service benefit from long-standing, trusting relationships with support individually tailored according to the young people's needs and wishes.

The report by inspectors adds: "A comprehensive local offer, combined with a range of creative and generous opportunities from the Council and its partners is contributing to positive outcomes for care leavers."

The inspectors found children in care to be well supported through the transition into leaving care services and adulthood.

Personal advisers are allocated when children are 16 years old while social workers start to plan for transitions by completing pathway plans with children to ensure that their involvement and voice are central to the planning for their future.

The report adds: There is a real focus in South Tyneside on acknowledging achievements that are important to the young person. Workers are clearly proud of how young people overcome challenges in their lives. Workers are very ambitious and have high aspirations for young people.

"Participation and engagement to obtain young people's views are embedded throughout the services and constitute a real strength in South Tyneside. Service developments co-designed with young people are innovative and young people have a service that is meaningful for them."

Infants, children and families to benefit from boost in support




To support parents, 75 local authorities have been announced as eligible for a share of £302 million to create new Family Hubs in their areas. South Tyneside Council are confirmed as one of those eligible authorities.

We strive to provide responsive, high quality and accessible services for children and families and this opportunity will enable us, together with families and partners, to build on existing services to continue to improve outcomes for children, young people, and families in the Borough. The Start for Life offer ensures our Family Hubs have a range of services such as health, breastfeeding, infant feeding, mental health support, SEND, parenting programmes and family support services which babies, children, and family need from pregnancy through the early years.

Support services are also offered beyond the early years, right up to the age of 19 years (25 years for young people with additional needs). By bringing services together within a colocated Family Hub model, this provides easier access for families to know about, and find the services they need, when they need them. Family Hubs also provide online support through a digital help and support service.

Cutting the cost in bulky waste trial

From the 1 April South Tyneside Council reduced the fee for a bulky waste collection. This is set for a six-month trial period to gauge its impact on flytipping levels across the Borough.

Bulky Waste Collections are ideal for residents wanting to dispose of items like furniture, white goods or large electrical appliances - items that are usually taken when people move house. Residents using the Bulky Waste Collection service can be assured that their waste is disposed of legally, safely and correctly.

However, those who choose private disposal services are urged to check that the businesses they use are legitimate waste carriers and that they receive a Waste Transfer Notice.

We are seeing more and more cases where unlicensed waste carriers either come recommended by others or offer to take away rubbish on the cheap. Even though residents are paying them in good faith, the waste is often not legitimately disposed of and is flytipped by the roadside or at Borough beauty spots instead.

As well as checking the business has a valid waste carriers licence, we would always encourage residents to obtain a Waste Transfer Note, otherwise they could be held responsible if their waste is found to be flytipped.

Bulky Waste Collections are not for the disposal of hazardous or commercial waste such as rubble and plaster. They also do not cover fixtures or fittings such as bathroom suites, kitchen units, doors and laminate flooring, which can be collected as part of the Borough's house or garden clearance schemes.

Residents using the Recycling Village can get a free Household Waste Permit from the Council if they want to dispose of their waste using a trailer, pick up or van.

80% of marine litter comes from the land and we all have a role to play to reduce this. Even if you don't live at the coast your actions will have an impact.

For example, litter dropped elsewhere in the borough (even as small as a cigarette end) can eventually end up in the sea.

South Tyneside Council and Homes take great pride in keeping our coastal area clean and tidy, and our waste and cleansing teams continue to work tirelessly to ensure it looks its best.

With good weather, and the summer holidays just around the corner, residents and visitors will flock to our beautiful coastline as families enjoy the outdoors. While we know that most people dispose of their litter responsibly, there is a minority of people who don't seem to care. We listened to residents and new litter bins are now installed across the seafront.

Please help us protect our coastline and our wildlife by putting litter in the bins provided or taking it home. It is extremely important that people do the right thing and dispose of their litter safely and responsibly.

We want a litter free South Tyneside. Leave only footprints on our beaches this summer.







The wrong item going into recycling is a growing problem across the country and impacts on how much can be successfully recycled. We're asking households to make sure their blue recycling bin only contains the right materials.

Cardboard packaging (cereal boxes, egg boxes, ready meal sleeves, toilet and kitchen cardboard roll holders) - No greasy takeaway boxes such as pizza boxes

we tackle contamination.

Plain card like birthday/ Christmas cards (not with any glue/glitter/metallic/3D pictures)

Glass bottles and jars (beer, wine, perfume, medicine bottles, pasta sauce)

Food tins

(baby milk formula, tins, pet food)

Drink cans

Aerosols

Cartons (milk, juice)

Plastic (milk, juice, water, shampoo bottles, washing up liquid, bleach, fabric softener bottles, yoghurt, soup, noodle pots, margarine, ice cream tubs)

Paper (Newspapers letters, writing paper, magazines, brochures)

Our waste teams will be out checking what is in blue recycling bins. When bins contain wrong items, they will not be emptied.

We don't like not emptying bins but it's important we tackle this growing problem. Several wrong items in a bin contaminates the whole load of recycling.

The household will be left with a tag on the bin handle with a reason why it cannot be recycled.

If you get a tag, remove the wrong items, then present your bin with the right items at your next collection.

The crew will not make a special return journey just for you. Make sure you have the right items in the right bin.

We understand that some people aren't sure what can be recycled which is why we ask everyone to check our website www.southtyneside.gov.uk/recycle

It's easy to make mistakes, which is why we will be looking at dropping a leaflet to households to remind them of what can be recycled.

Nothing has changed. The same items cannot be recycled. Common items remain including nappies, crisp packets, clothes, shoes, blankets and food.

TOP TIP!

Use the dishwater after washing your dishes and give the yoghurt pots, tins, bottles and cans a quick rinse.

Recycling could also increase if residents gave their yoghurt or milk cartons a quick rinse before putting them in the blue bin.

DON'T BAG recycling. Drop it straight into the bin. We don't want any black sacks or plastic bags of any kind in the recycling bin.


BATTERIES

Every household across South Tyneside has a sticker on their bins reminding them to not put batteries in the bins.

It's important that you dispose of batteries properly.

This is to prevent fires in the sorting plant and to protect our crew. There are lots of places in South Tyneside where you can recycle batteries. As well as the Recycling Village, many shops and supermarkets offer a drop off point.

Government data shows thousands of tonnes of recycling collected by local councils is being rejected at the point of sorting because it was contaminated.



South Tyneside has one of the highest levels of contamination in the North East and the highest amount of waste per household.



We'd like to change that with your help. Simply check your recycling before placing in the bin.



Junk mail - The Mailing Preference Service (MPS) is a free service which enables consumers to have their names removed from lists used by the advertising industry.

This is South Tyneside PARADE


SATURDAY 2 JULY • 12.30PM-5PM



Queen's Baton Relay

South Tyneside is gearing up to welcome the Birmingham 2022 Queen's Baton Relay to the Borough this summer.

Birmingham 2022 is hosting the 16th official Queen's Baton Relay – an epic journey bringing communities together across the Commonwealth during the build up to the Commonwealth Games Opening Ceremony on 28 July.

In the final leg of the journey – a 25-day tour of England – the Queen's Baton will visit South Tyneside on Friday 15 July during its two days in the region.

Communities are encouraged to line the route along Sea Road, between the New Crown Roundabout and Harbour Drive North at Littlehaven. The baton is expected to arrive early morning.

The Queen's Baton Relay is being carried through Commonwealth territories by thousands of Batonbearers - local people who have inspired others, made an impact in their community or are representative of the values of the Games.

Nine people will carry the Baton through South Tyneside.



Community champion Ann Walsh, of East Boldon, is one of the inspirational people chosen as a Batonbearer after being nominated by the Council.



Ann was selected in recognition of her tireless work raising hundreds of thousands of pounds for Cancer Research UK and organising the annual Relay for Life at Jarrow's Monkton Stadium.

Ann, aged 63, said: "It's a huge honour and privilege to be chosen to represent the area on such an important occasion.

"I was delighted to learn I had been nominated to be a Batonbearer and finding out the nomination was made by the Council made it even more special. The Council has always been supportive of my charity work and to have its support for this means a great deal. When I found out I had actually been selected I couldn't believe it."

Communities across South Tyneside have been celebrating in style as Her Majesty The Queen marks her Platinum Jubilee.



The Borough joined communities around the world to celebrate The Queen's 70th year on the throne with a range of events and activities over the extended four-day bank holiday weekend of 2-5 June.

In the run up to the celebrations, the Council worked with local groups to plant 70 new trees as part of the Queen's Green Canopy initiative. An avenue of cherry trees was also planted in South Marine Park, South Shields.

Schools, libraries and community organisations also held their own celebrations to mark the historic milestone, from jubilee-themed crafts and reading activities to street parties, fun days, sports tournaments and afternoon teas – to name a few.

Many of the activities and community projects were supported by the Council's Platinum Jubilee Community Grant – a new £30,000 fund dedicated to supporting local events and projects celebrating the Platinum Jubilee around the Jubilee Bank Holiday.

The grants scheme supported around 100 applications across a wide range of clubs, groups, residents' and community associations, schools, 'Friends of' groups and older people's housing and supported living projects.

– including a special

Local people also came together to take part in the national Big Jubilee Lunch event, enjoying street parties with their neighbours, garden barbecues or picnics in their local parks.





Supporting our Armed Forces Community

The Council helps to support the armed forces through the Navy, Army, Airforce and Families Institute (NAAFI) Break - a dedicated face-to-face drop in service, established in 2016, which enables serving and ex-service personnel, reservists and their families, to socialise and get support on civilian life.

Joe Mills, Army veteran and NAAFI Break chairman, is truly committed to NAAFI Break and this dedication comes from his own experiences. Joe joined the Army, the Royal Irish Fusiliers (Princess Victoria's Own) North Irish Brigade (Regiment of the Line), in 1964 as an Infantry soldier and served for six years.

Later, he joined a veteran's branch of the Royal Irish Rangers at Gaza Barrack, which lasted two years due to low membership. In 2006, himself and colleagues of the Royal Irish Rangers formed a second branch in Catterick which is still going today.

Joe Mills said: "While running The Royal Irish Rangers Association in Catterick, I soon became aware of the difficulties ex-service personnel face when leaving the military service; homelessness, marital and addiction issues to name but a few.

"When I became aware of NAAFI Break supporting veterans in my hometown of South Shields, as a veteran I was keen to attend. The reservist who ran it left his position and I didn't want the veterans who attended to suddenly not have the support system that was gaining new attendees on a regular basis, so I decided to continue to volunteer and keep NAAFI Break running."

The NAAFI Break group has grown from strength to strength. In 2020, the veterans formed a committee and constitution and welcomed Lieutenant General Robin Brims as their Patron.

Through its Armed Forces Community Covenant pledge, the Council works to ensure services personnel are not disadvantaged when accessing public services.

During the Covid-19 pandemic, NAAFI Break's usual meetings were temporarily suspended, however they utilised virtual platforms to ensure veterans continued to get vital support. Face-to-face meetings returned at the end of 2021.

This dedication and commitment led to Joe Mills, and his daughter Kirsty Mills, to be nominated for a #LoveSouthTyneside Award and shortlisted in the top three nominees

Over the course of the last financial year, South Tyneside Council worked with communities to deliver on its priority to plant 3000 trees per year. Together with communities, we've more than delivered and the whole borough is greener as a result!

Tree planting started in April 2021 when the council distributed 75 fruit trees to local schools to plant.

Funding was also secured under the Urban Tree Challenge Fund to plant and maintain 600 heavy standard trees on new sites around the borough.

The council then secured further funding from the Local Authority
Treescape Fund to plant over 80 heavy standard trees to replace trees naturally lost. The majority have been planted in parks across the borough, with most major parks receiving trees.

Furthermore, the council planted 150 heavy standard trees as part of its routine annual tree planting target, as well as 3000 whips, mostly in Temple Park, South Shields and Jubilee Wood, Jarrow. This was partially funded by Council budget and the newly established North East Community Forest and Trees For Cities organisation.

The council was not alone in its tree planting endeavours, with colleagues from the Durham and Northumberland Wildlife Trust, the many "friends of" groups and many elected members pitching in to plant trees across the borough.

Unfortunately, the unprecedented storms over the last year meant that many trees were lost due to severe storm damage. However, the sheer volume of trees planted means that there was still a net gain in tree canopy coverage. These new trees are susceptible to damage or decline during establishment and the Council is monitoring and watering these trees regularly, with a view to replacing any that don't survive.

Dog fouling. Bag It. Bin It.

Dog fouling is a big concern, not just because of the mess it causes, but because it can also be a health risk. Many dog owners in South Tyneside are responsible and bag their dog mess, but the minority are spoiling our streets, play areas and open spaces.

What are we doing?

The Council is committed to raising awareness about the issue of dog fouling and will respond reactively and pro-actively to reported incidents.

The Council is currently:

- Using stencils to paint 'No Fouling' in key areas in South Tyneside
- installing bins where they haven't been provided previously - but, did you know you can use any public bin to dispose of your bagged dog waste?
- utilising Council and private CCTV / mobile phone material - to identify irresponsible dog owners who do not pick up after their dogs

• training officers on the street -Council and South Tyneside Homes officers are being trained to issue Fixed Penalty Notices, talk to people, encourage responsible dog ownership and hand out poop-scoop bags.

We need your help. If you see it. Report It.

Did you know...

- Around 100 cases of toxocariasis are diagnosed each year in the UK
- Local authorities in the UK receive approximately 226,000 complaints about dog fouling every year

- The cost to British taxpayers of clearing up after dogs is around £2.3 million per year
- It is an offence for anyone in charge of a dog on public land to fail to remove dog faeces deposited by that dog

How are dog fouling incidents enforced?

The Borough of South Tyneside is covered by a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) which prohibits the fouling of land by dogs.

Allowing a dog that you own (or are in control of) to foul public land without picking it up immediately, is an offence that attracts a fixed penalty. A number of Council and South Tyneside Homes officers can enforce the Public Space Protection Order.

Time to put the brakes on nuisance bikers

South Tyneside Council, Northumbria Police and South Tyneside Homes are working together to deal with motorcycle nuisance in the borough.

Riding on open land, parks, rights of way and footpaths is almost always illegal. Even on private land, permission is required from the owner of the land.

Report motorcycle nuisance

If you are affected by motorcycle nuisance please help us prevent it by reporting it:

- Northumbria Police call 101

It is helpful if you let us know:

- Details of the motorcycle (e.g. number plate, make, model and colour and where it is stored)
- Details of the rider (e.g. name, address and what they are wearing)
- When and where the motorcycle is being used (e.g. days, times and routes)

Any information will be treated in the strictest confidence.

What can we do?

- Seize the motorcycles and have them destroyed
- Take tenancy enforcement action against the owner of the motorcycles
- Use our Public Spaces Protection Order to issue fixed penalty notices

Riding a motorcycle on a road

To be used on a public highway, motorcycles must be constructed to a specific standard and are required to have:

- A VALID MOT
- INSURANCE
- ROAD TAX AND
- BE REGISTERED

The rider must also:

- BE AGED 17 OR OVER
- HOLD A VALID DRIVING LICENSE
- WEAR A SUITABLE CRASH HELMET

What is 'a road'?

As well as the carriageway, footpaths alongside roads are part of the road. Pushing a motorcycle along the footpaths means it is on the road.

The law

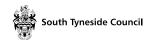
Under the Police Reform Act, the police can seize motor vehicles that are used to cause alarm, distress, or annoyance to members of the public. Repeat offenders are warned that they may have their motor vehicle taken from them and disposed of and they may have to pay the cost of recovery.

Parents are warned that they may be liable to pay a recovery fee on any cycle seized from their child. Think twice before you let your child out on that motorbike!

You can only ride an off-road motorbike legally if it is on private land and you have the land owner's permission. Land owned by the local council is not classed as private land. In law off road motorbikes are regarded as motor vehicles which must be constructed to a specific standard in order to be ridden on a public highway. Most off road motorbikes do not meet this standard. Visit the Department for Transport website: www.dft.gov.uk for more information.

The Twinnedlt process creates a 'digital twin' of buildings and stores information such as construction details and materials all in one place. 

of Health Social determinants, sometimes called wider

determinants, are a diverse range of social, economic and environmental factors which impact on people's health

Where we are born, live, work and how old we are all affect our health and wellbeing. Many experts agree that these social determinants can be more important than actual health care services.

In the last Director of Public Health's annual report, hypothetical children Jack and Emily were used to demonstrate the differences of two children born on the same day but from different parts of the borough.

The report detailed the impact that this had on their health and wellbeing throughout their lives. Jack was born in Simonside and Rekendyke and Emily in Cleadon and East Boldon. Their journeys through life are shockingly different, resulting in Jack expecting to live 75 years and Emily 87 years; a whole 12 years longer.

The examples of social determinants described in the 2019 report included childhood experiences, housing, education, social support, family income, employment, communities and access to healthcare. We'll be covering these topics in more detail in future editions.

Active Travel Challenge

Active travel means getting about in a way that makes you physically active, like walking or cycling.

It usually means short journeys, like walking to the shops or local school, cycling to work or to see friends and family. Many journeys that people make using cars are under 5 miles, so there's real potential to swap the car for walking and cycling.

Not only can active travel have a positive effect on our health and wellbeing, walking, cycling, scooting or wheeling can also help reduce our impact on the environment. Choosing an active mode of transport provides opportunities for us all to be more physically active and develop our road safety skills. It also helps tackle congestion and reduce air pollution.

South Tyneside Council invited local schools to take part in an Active Travel Challenge which took place throughout May 2022. We wanted see children, parents/ guardians and school staff opting for a more sustainable way to travel to school whether this be walking, cycling, wheeling or

scooting. We invited all schools in South Tyneside to take part in the challenge and be in with a chance of winning up to £2,000 for their school to help support future active travel initiatives. Schools used the #STactivetravelchallenge hashtag to share photos and videos on Twitter or Facebook to show how children, parents/quardians and teaching staff applied active travel to the school run and beyond.

It was great to see so many South Tyneside residents take part in the challenge. Some children searched for treasures and flowers whilst others enjoyed riding their scooter to school.

The top five prizes are due to go to schools with the best selection of engaging and innovative posts. South Tyneside Council encouraged posts that shone a light on the environmental benefits of active travel! We also wanted to see how schools encouraged children, parents and staff to choose an active mode of transport as a long-term option and not just throughout the month of May!

Summer Health

A lot of us welcome the warmer weather, but when it's too hot there can be health risks, especially for the very young, elderly or those with long term medical conditions.

If hot weather hits this summer, make sure it does not harm you or your loved ones by following these top tips:

- Protect your skin with clothing, including a hat, t-shirt and sunglasses
- Stay out of the sun between 11am and 3pm
- Use a 'high protection' sunscreen of at least SPF 30 which also has high UVA protection and apply it generously and frequently when in
- Keep babies, young children and the elderly out of direct sunlight

- Close curtains on rooms that face the sun to keep indoor spaces cooler and remember it may be cooler outdoors than indoors
- Drink plenty of fluids and avoid excess alcohol
- Never leave anyone in a closed, parked vehicle, especially infants, young children or animals
- Avoid exercising in the hottest parts of the day
- If you are going into open water to cool down, take care and follow local safety advice






