Her Majesty Queen

South Tyneside united with the rest of the country in September to mourn the death of the much-loved late Queen.

Elizabeth II passed away at the age of 96 and was the nation's longest-reigning monarch, having been head of state for more than 70 years.

The Borough joined communities around the country, and across the Commonwealth, in paying tribute to the Sovereign, with residents leaving heartfelt messages in books of condolence and laving flowers in her honour.

The Mayor of South Tyneside, Cllr Pat Hay, held a private moment of reflection on the eve of her late Majesty's funeral and encouraged residents to hold their own vigils marked with a national two-minute silence. She also proclaimed the new King Charles III, in line with national protocol.

Earlier in the year, the Borough had celebrated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, with events and activities taking place to mark her 70th year on the throne.

South Tyneside joined towns and cities across the country in the lighting of more than 1,500 beacons - including special beacon lightings at Littlehaven and the Lawe Top, in South Shields.

The Borough had the privilege of welcoming the Queen on three occasions during her seven-decade reign.

On 29 October 1954 crowds lined the streets and waved flags when she visited the Borough as part of her Coronation tour of the UK.

Her Majesty again visited in October 1967 to officially open the Tyne Tunnel in Jarrow.

And in July 1977 thousands of people packed into Gypsies Green stadium in South Shields to catch a glimpse of the Queen, who was visiting with Prince Philip as part of her Silver Jubilee tour.


Her late Majesty will be remembered with great fondness across South Tyneside for her unwavering dedication and service to the country.





Levelling Up Bids

The Council has submitted bids to the £4.8billion Levelling Up Fund for both the Jarrow and South Shields constituencies.

The bids aim to revitalise the Borough's three towns by capitalising on the growing green economy, innovation, and skills, and attracting visitors by enhancing the cultural offer.

The £20million Jarrow proposal will seek to create a sustainable mid-Tyne, with a package of related investments across Jarrow and Hebburn.

It would include a substantial extension of the Hebburn renewable energy scheme, which will cut carbon over the coming years.

The expansion would be complemented by significant investment at Jarrow Hall to create a world-class sustainable visitor destination.

The three-part South Shields submission, also for £20million, focuses on revitalising the riverside and town centre by boosting footfall and visitor numbers.

The transformational project would include developing the **Customs House** and a cultural quarter; creating a skills and visitor centre - the **Northern Renewable Energy Centre of Excellence** - at Holborn Renewable Energy Network; and a student accommodation offer as part of **South Tyneside College** relocating into the town centre.

Both bids seek to nuture the Borough's innovation and ambition and ensure that South Tyneside continues to be at the forefront of the green revolution, creating jobs and opportunities for residents.





"Levelling up is all about fairness and ensuring residents and businesses in South Tyneside have access to the same opportunities as elsewhere in the country.

UK Shared Prosperity Fund

The Council has developed a high-level investment plan to help unlock millions of pounds of government funding to support growth and prosperity.

The plan is needed to access the Borough's three-year allocation of £8.87milllion from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, which aims to 'build pride in place and increase life chances across the UK'.

The submission sets out how the money will be spent to help achieve the fund objectives of boosting productivity, opportunities, pay, jobs and living standards, as well as enhancing a sense of community and local pride.

Earlier this year the Council launched a South Tyneside Prospectus and invited bids from organisations that could deliver projects which would meet the objectives and complement key local growth priorities.

More than 100 expressions of interest were received and were appraised, including evaluation by an independent third party.

Eight 'ready to go' projects were identified in the Local Investment Plan. These deliver on the Fund's themes such as town centres, culture, business support, green spaces, fuel poverty, digital inclusion, anti-social behaviour and community engagement, as well as aligning with the council's key priorities.

Green economy in South Tyneside

A 'Levelling Up in Practice' report published stated that the Borough is leading the way on green energy.

It said: 'South Tyneside's past was dominated by industry... But the future of South Tyneside lies in the green economy. The Council is leading the way on geothermal as a way to generate energy, pumping water around former mining shafts deep underground to capture heat which is then distributed through nearby homes. The challenge in South Tyneside is providing a bridge from the old to the new.'

The report has emphasised the potential for the Borough to lead the way on the green economy and states both that 'South Tyneside has a bright green future' and 'in the next few decades this part of the North East could be at the heart of the green economy, as they were for the industrial economy in previous centuries.'

South Tyneside has an enormous potential and is destined to be a major contributor to the national economy due to its unrivalled position to drive forward the green economy and become the battery of the country, powering the low-carbon revolution.

An investment in South Tyneside is not just about the local benefits it can bring, but about the ability to use the Borough's strengths, expertise and natural assets for the benefit of the nation's economy.

The research highlighted that the Borough can improve the quality of life for residents by maximising the opportunities from a green economy.

The Council is driving forward this ambition with ground breaking renewable energy schemes in all three towns,

developing IAMP as a hub for electric vehicle production and partnership with the Port of Tyne on offshore wind (the Port is the base for the world's largest offshore wind farm at Dogger Bank).

It is also working to bring about national policy change, particularly around skills, and funding so that the Borough can realise its full potential.

The report particularly emphasised the need for a bridge from the old industrial heritage to the new economy and connecting people to jobs, which is a key theme coming through the work to refresh the South Tyneside 20-year Vision

The Council and partners are working collectively to break down significant barriers to growth like levels of unemployment and inequality, engaging with local residents and businesses as things move forward.

The Council has been developing an Influencing Plan. This aims to raise the profile of the borough amongst key decision makers to improve our chances of securing funding and policy change. The work from the report is part of ongoing activity to help build South Tyneside's profile, showcase our key assets, build up our evidence base, shape our refreshed vision and work to strengthen our relationships with key decision-makers.

The Council's recent Levelling Up Fund bids for both Jarrow and South Shields constituencies seek to extend the Borough's innovative renewable energy schemes, support further education, transform our town centre economies, particularly through culture, and nurture the green innovation happening in South Tyneside.

Celebrating Armed Forces Day

Reflecting on a memorable year

The Mayor of South Tyneside, Councillor Pat Hay, and Mayoress Jean Copp, continue to enjoy a busy schedule of civic engagements and events.

They have played a key role representing the Borough and promoting civic pride as well as raising money for their chosen charities Cancer Connections and the Customs House as well as other good causes.

Recent highlights include Armed Forces Day which saw South Tyneside residents turn out in force to pay tribute to military organisations. The event included a cavalcade of hundreds of motorbikes and a colourful military parade along the seafront.

South Tyneside welcomed guests from across Europe ahead of the Mr Gay England and Mr Gay Europe finals which were hosted in the region. South Shields is the home town of the competition's Chief Executive and he was determined the show delegates all the Borough has to offer.

Other highlights included the dedication of the new Hebburn Sea Cadets boating pontoon and the special remembrance service for the victims of Srebrenica.

As part of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, South Tyneside welcomed the Queen's Baton Relay. Inspiring members of the community were nominated as official baton bearers in recognition of their contribution to the arts, culture, sport, education or charity. Celebrations then turned to sadness at the passing of Her Majesty the Queen. Once again, South Tyneside came together as a community to mourn, reflect upon and express their gratitude for Her Majesty the Queen's lifetime of devotion.

The Mayor said:

"The last few months have seen both great joy and tremendous sadness for our country. I have been incredibly proud to represent the Borough on these momentous occasions.

"It is an absolute honour to connect with our communities and celebrate their achievements. It is fantastic to continue to meet so many wonderful people who make the Borough such a special place."

Major remodelling works have been completed at the Borough's crematorium.

The eight-month project at South Shields Crematorium has involved extending the chapel area into the former internal courtyard. The enlarged chapel now enables the Council to cater for larger funerals, with capacity increased by around 126, providing seating for more than 200 visitors as well as extra standing space.

Improvements to the 1960s building has also involved repositioning the pulpit and seating to provide better sight lines for those paying respects to family and friends. A new partition wall can also be used when required for smaller, more intimate funerals.

The entrance, waiting and exit areas have also been redecorated to a modern respectful standard.

The Crematorium plays a key role in the community, supporting local people at what can be an extremely distressing and difficult time in their lives.

As the only crematorium to serve South Tyneside, investment has been important to ensure the building is up-to-date so that we can continue to provide a respectful service for families paying tribute to their loved ones. It is also important that it is fit for purpose and able to cater for larger funerals for the residents of South Tyneside.

The £800,000 project, which began in January, included a scheduled three-month closure over the summer months. Cremators have also been upgraded which were almost 25 years old and in need of replacement. The new wider cremators not only accommodate larger coffins but are more energy efficient and will help to reduce the building's carbon emissions by around 240 tonnes per year.

Now that the works are complete, this improved modern facility helps provide residents with the best possible service during their time of need while giving people a fitting end to their lives.




As always, our Involved customers have played a big part in the production of this report, handpicking elements they believe will be of interest to our wider customer base.



Making the grade in South Tyneside

South Tyneside schools and nurseries have celebrated a number of Outstanding and Good Ofsted ratings in recent months, demonstrating that the Council is delivering on its priority of supporting families.

Three nursery schools have had Outstanding ratings from Ofsted.



The Council-run **Stanleys at Bede**, which cares for 28 two to four-year-olds, has been rated as Outstanding in all areas. The inspector described the nursery as a "well-organised" and "exciting" place where children flourish and managers have high expectations for each child. The excellent teaching skills of staff, strong partnership working with parents and the behaviour of children were also commended.



Stanleys at Hebburn has also been rated as Outstanding, moving up from its previous rating of Good. The inspector described the nursery as a "welcoming" and "inclusive" setting where children are "extremely happy, settled and secure."



Ofsted inspectors also rated **Stanleys at All Saints as Good**. They described the nursery as a friendly place where staff work well together and have a good understanding of each child's individual care needs.

Two primary schools have had Good ratings from Ofsted.



Toner Avenue School in Hebburn

moved up from its previous grade of Requires Improvement to Good. Inspectors noted a 'significant level of improvement in the quality of education.' They described the school as one where pupils are 'happy and confident' and where parents feel staff go 'above and beyond' to make sure students succeed.



East Boldon Infants School was also rated as Good. In their report, inspectors spoke highly about the kindness ethos that runs through the school, recognising "this is a friendly school, with kindness at its heart. Adults show pupils how to build and maintain relationships built on respect."

Fostering provides children who are unable to live with their birth family a stable, loving home.

South Tyneside is one of a small number of Councils delivering the Mockingbird programme - a new way of providing foster care.

Our fostering team at South Tyneside Council is always happy to talk and meet people who have an interest in fostering. In South Tyneside we have an urgent need for more foster carers to become part of our foster family.

Who can foster?

Foster carers can be single or married, same sex, employed or unemployed, a home owner or living in rented accommodation. Foster carers are as different as the children they care for.

We want to help our foster carers be the best carers possible and to give South Tyneside's children the best start in life.

Who could you help?

Mother and baby – could you support a young mother and her baby? Care for mam and baby offering guidance in the care of the baby.

Older children – Could you offer a home to older children, giving them security, care and guidance?

Sibling groups – Do you have 2 or more spare rooms? Could you look after a sibling group and keep families together?

Long term fostering – Are you able to help a child for many years? Perhaps for the whole of their childhood and beyond?



Why foster with **South Tyneside Council?**

We will be with you on every step of the journey, offering training, help and advice where needed. When you foster with South Tyneside Council, you are part of a team. If you become a foster carer, you will be teamed up with a fostering officer who will offer support and advice. Wider support includes options to help you in your role including psychologists, nursing, and schools. Ongoing training for your personal development and career is available.

Stay Well this

Double your defences against COVID-19 and flu this winter. Across the North East and North Cumbria our NHS teams are working hard to vaccinate people against Covid-19 and flu.



Flu is a serious condition that kills thousands and hospitalizes thousands more in England each year. The flu vaccination is the best protection for you and those around you, which is why it is offered for free to those most at risk.



Visit www.nhs.uk/fluvaccine to find out if you're eligible and for more information.

Flu can also be nasty for children and lead to more serious illnesses such as bronchitis. Children can catch and spread flu easily. Vaccinating them helps to protect others who are vulnerable to flu, such as babies and older people. The children's nasal spray flu vaccine is safe and effective.

Adults at high risk from flu are also most at risk from coronavirus, which causes Covid-19, so some people may be eligible for both the flu and the COVID-19 booster vaccines to help protect them from a double threat this winter. The vaccines are safe & effective and give you the best protection against the viruses. If you are offered both vaccines, it's safe to have them at the same time.

There are lots of other ways you can help yourself to stay well this winter, including:

- Keep your medicines cabinet well-stocked with the basics, such as pain killers, antihistamines, cold & flu remedies, a first aid kit and phone numbers for your GP & Pharmacy.
- Stay active No matter our fitness levels we should all try to move around every day, from chair based exercises to going to the gym and everything in between!
- Look after your Mental health search Every Mind Matters for useful tools and tips.
- Maintain good hand and respiratory hygiene remember 'catch it, bin it, kill it' for coughs and sneezes then wash or sanitize your hands straight away. Stay at home if you have a high temperature and do not feel well enough to do your normal activities.
- **Keep warm** by blocking out drafts, having regular hot drinks & meals and using a hot water bottle OR electric blanket in bed.
- Wrap up in warm clothing and sturdy shoes when going outside in cold weather.


South Tyneside Council launched our Age Friendly journey on the 1st October 2022, International Day of the Older Person.

The National Routine Immunisation Programme is determined by NHS England.

The Routine Immunisation Programmes that are delivered by The School Aged Immunisation Team are as follows:

Nasal Flu Spray: From Reception up to Year 6 (also any other year groups determined by Public Health England that year). This programme is generally delivered between September-December.

Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) Injection, Currently 2 doses needed for both Boys and Girls.

1st Dose Year 8

2nd Dose Year 9

Tetanus, Diphtheria and Polio (Booster) Year 9

Meningitis and Septicaemia Year 9

Return your used inhalers - and help with climate change

If you use inhalers, you can make a real difference to climate change by disposing of them safely.

That's the message from local doctors, who are calling on patients to return used inhalers to their pharmacy for safe disposal.

Many inhalers contain powerful greenhouse gases even after the medication is used up – and these can leak out and contribute to climate change if put in your household bin.

Dr Nousha Ali, a local GP and clinical director for the NHS's North East and North Cumbria Integrated Care Board, said: "If every used inhaler in South Tyneside was returned for safe disposal, it would save 15,000kg of carbon dioxide every year – that's the same as driving to London 41 times.



Did you know?

If every used inhaler in South Tyneside is returned for safe disposal, it will save as much CO₂ as driving to London 41 times a year.

Easy to return - just use the special bin at your local pharmacy

"Inhalers are a lifeline for many patients and it's important to have one that works for you. Never stop an inhaler without speaking to your nurse or doctor first.

"Climate change affects lung health in many ways, so it really is a chance to be greener and breathe better."

Pressurised metered dose inhalers contain a greenhouse gas up to 3,000 times more potent than carbon dioxide. They typically have 30% of the original propellant remaining when fully used. This is destroyed if the inhaler is incinerated with clinical waste, but if it goes to landfill the gases continue to be released.

Every pharmacy in South Tyneside now has a specially labelled inhaler bin on display. Many patients can make an even bigger difference by switching to eco-friendly dry powder inhalers for most of their needs. While one blue inhaler makes the same climate change impact as driving from South Shields to Liverpool, a dry powder inhaler is equivalent to driving from Shields to Jarrow.

Bye bye UTI!

Pharmacies can now treat many urinary tract infections

Ouch! If you have a burning or stinging sensation when you wee, it could be a UTI (or urinary tract infection).

But here's the good news: local pharmacists can treat women aged 16-64 with urinary tract infections without the need for a GP appointment or prescription.

UTIs are one of the most common bacterial infections among female patients, with over 40% of women likely to suffer from one in their lifetime.

The symptoms include a burning or stinging sensation on passing urine, needing to wee more frequently or urgently, cloudy urine and passing large quantities of urine.

South Tyneside was the first area in the North East to make this new service available, with the rest of the region now following suit. This means that pharmacists can not only advise and support but also provide treatment, where this is appropriate.



A helping hand for your family

We all worry when our little ones are poorly - and sometimes it's hard to know how best to help them.

From tummy bugs and chickenpox to bumped heads and mental wellbeing, the Healthier Together app or website can give you practical advice from medical professionals, 24/7.

It tells you what to look out for, which things you can safely treat at home, and when you need professional help.

If it's something that needs medical attention, Healthier Together tells you the best place to go. A 'red flag' means you need the emergency department, or you may just need a little reassurance that all you need is a trip to the pharmacy.

And it's not just about a crisis: You can find advice on everything from milk allergies or emotional wellbeing to "should my child go to school today?"





The top 5 things that cannot be recycled this Christmas.

TOP OF THE LIST 1.GLITTER

Can glitter be recycled? Absolutely not!

If there is one thing that residents can do to help our environment this Christmas, PLEASE do NOT place ANY item with glitter into your blue recycling bin. No cards, no decorations, no wrapping paper and no pictures.



Wrapping paper is a tricky one!
Yes, to brown paper without
sticky tape BUT most wrapping
paper cannot be recycled
because it is often laminated
with plastic, foil or other nonpaper materials. ... Some wrapping

Recycling

paper is very thin and contains few good quality fibres so is not suitable for recycling. Either save and re-use or dispose of in your household waste bin.



Traditional glitter is made up of microplastics that cannot be recycled. Most glitter ends up in our oceans and back into our bodies!

Even eco glitter that dissolves in water – PLEASE put in your grey household bin.

Glitter causes a whole lot of problems for the recycling crew. During the treatment process glitter ends up in the finished product and is rejected by the company. Glitter ends up contaminating the whole load of recyclables. Last year in South Tyneside a lot of recycling was rejected due to glitter!

4.CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

NONE. Do not put tinsel, holly wreaths, plastic trees, glass baubles or Christmas lights in the blue recycling bin.
The lights get tangled in the recycling load and will cause

problems at the processing plant. You can donate to a charity shop if in good condition OR put in your grey bin.



5.GREETING CARDS

Only plain cards – with no glitter or foil etc. Plain card and envelopes are great for recycling!

2.FOOD

Don't put food in the blue recycling bin. Food will contaminate all the other recyclable materials collected. Use your grey bin for food including peelings, take away and leftovers etc.





REDUCE REUSE, RECYCLE

South Tyneside Council encourages residents to do their bit for the environment by reducing the amount of household waste they produce, reusing items that would otherwise be thrown out by giving them a second life as often as possible, and recycling correctly.

Earlier this year, the Council rolled out our own campaigns such as 'Motion for the Ocean' and encouraged residents to support national recycling campaigns such as the 'Big Plastic Count 2022' - which looked at ways to tackle the plastic crisis.



Excess food

Did you know the UK wastes 2 million turkeys, 5 million Christmas puddings and 74 million mince pies each year at Christmas?

Food waste is a serious issue – especially at Christmas. Campaigns run by food charities such as Love Food Hate Waste have loads of tips and menu ideas.

Understanding Recycling Symbols

Residents told us that they do not understand some of the recycling symbols on packaging and don't understand what can be recycled in the blue recycling bin.

We have pulled together a quick overview for residents to help understand what can and cannot be recycled this year.

The on-pack recycling label (or OPRL)



A number of different recycling symbols are featured on lots of everyday items and are there to help us identify how and which types of different packaging can be recycled. However, just because an item says its recyclable does not necessarily mean all items can be recycled – so if in doubt, leave it out your blue recycling bin and pop into your grey household bin!

Our Council website at **www.southtyneside.gov.uk/recycle** has a full list of A-Z items to help understand what can and cannot be recycled in the blue bin.

Plastic Resin Codes Symbol

These display a 'Resin Identification Code', which is represented by a number between 1 and 7 in the middle of the arrows. his helps identify the type of plastic resin used to make the item.




Glass bottles and jars can be rinsed and placed into your BLUE recycling bin or taken to the Recycling Village.

Window pane glass, mirrors, glass from picture frames, photo frames, broken glass tumblers, light bulbs, spectacles, ceramics, or glass ovenware such as Pyrex dishes CANNOT be recycled through the blue recycling bin.

Reminder: NEVER put broken glass into your recycling bin. Dispose of this carefully through your GREY household bin.





Cost of Living

Are you worried about the rising cost of energy bills, food and transport? You are not alone. The cost of living crisis is affecting many of us. That's why it is important to know what information and support is available - that could benefit you, a relative, friend or neighbour. Whatever your money worries, we've put together some helpful information below to help.

Council support Household Support Fund

The Household Support Fund is designed to help ease financial pressure on residents with low incomes. In South Tyneside, the funding has been allocated across a range of different groups with a focus on households that are on the lowest income. Those eligible have been contacted direct by the Council or through a third party, such as schools or outreach support.



Local Welfare Provision Scheme

Funding for this scheme has been increased using money from the Household Support Fund. This scheme provides short term financial help if you have a financial crisis or need help with your daily living expenses because you are experiencing exceptional hardship.

You will need to apply for this fund to check if you are eligible.

Applications will be considered on a case-by-case basis. You will need to provide proof of your circumstances. Support is provided in the form of vouchers that you can use for food and energy.

Welfare Support Service

This service is available to all residents in South Tyneside. The Welfare Support Service is the first point of contact for money advice in South Tyneside. They provide debt, benefit and money advice on the phone. The service is free, impartial and confidential.

Crisis support

The Welfare Support Service also manages the Local Welfare Provision scheme. This is the Council-run scheme which provides crisis expenses and community care support.

Modern Slavery Spot the signs

Modern slavery is a serious crime being committed across the UK in which victims are exploited for someone else's gain.

Modern Slavery captures a whole range of exploitation including trafficking, sexual exploitation, domestic servitude, child slavery and criminal exploitation. It has a devastating and lasting impact on victims, children and families.

Modern slavery is often hidden in plain sight. It can affect anyone from any background or walk of life. It can be challenging to identify a potential victim of modern slavery and potential victims may be reluctant or unable to come forward themselves.

There are, however, some signs to look out for:

- They may look malnourished, unkempt, or uneasy
- They may have untreated injuries
- Someone pays for their travel and they rarely travel on their own
- Someone often speaks for them
- · Living and working at the same address
- They are picked up and dropped off from work at unusual times
- They may not be sure of their own address

Stand up to abuse this Christmas

Domestic abuse can happen to anyone at any time of the year. Christmas and New Year should be a time of joy and celebration, but it can be an extremely difficult time of year, for those living in fear of violence or abuse in their own homes.



"Our call to end violence in South Tyneside by raising awareness, educating, and campaigning to bring about change is greatly strengthened by working together with our White Ribbon accredited organisations."

Cllr Ruth Berkley, Lead member Voluntary Sector, Partnerships and Equalities Evidence suggests that domestic abuse increases during the festive period, with experts highlighting financial and social stress as main factors, as well as increased alcohol consumption.

November 25th is White Ribbon Day across the world. White Ribbon is a global campaign that encourages people, and especially men and boys, to take action and change the behaviour and culture that leads to abuse and violence.

This year South Tyneside Council and South Tyneside Homes became White Ribbon accredited. This means that over the coming months, the Council and partners will raise awareness and implement strategies to tackle domestic abuse and violence in South Tyneside, by promoting a culture of respect and equality across the community.

Domestic abuse can often go unreported, and this is often because the victim feels afraid of their abuser, preventing them from speaking up and seeking help.

A non-judgemental way to approach a friend or somebody you know that you are worried about is to ask them if they are ok, ask them if they want to talk, and let them know that you are there to help. Victims of domestic abuse often feel alone so it is important to break that sense of isolation and gain the victim's trust. Don't forget to also think about your own safety. Find a private spot when talking to the victim and be wary of who may be listening to the conversation.

If somebody is using physical, emotional, sexual, or financial behaviours to control a person they are in a relationship with, or an ex-partner – that's domestic abuse and it is against the law.

Monkton Stadium

Work is currently underway for a £700,000 renovation of Monkton Stadium, a much-loved community sports facility in Dene Terrace, Jarrow.

The renovation will boast a number of improvements for visitors, including:

Gym space extension

The gym area will include a new 'green gym' area. The exercise machines in the green gym captures energy generated from a workout, converting it into usable electricity that will help power devices connected to the local grid. This new area will reduce overall energy consumption from the facility and help work towards the Council's pledge to become carbon neutral by 2030.

Sauna room and changing facilities

There will be a new sauna room available for use and a refurbishment of the changing rooms, to help improve the visitor experience.

Outbuilding to support athletic events

Monkton Stadium is a major athletic venue, which plays host to regional and national events and is home to various sports clubs including Jarrow and Hebburn Athletic Club. It has also acted for a training facility for teams participating in international events over the years. The outbuilding will be purposed to support these events and community sports.

The internal revamp of Monkton Stadium is the latest in a series of investments in the Borough's leisure and library facilities. It follows the new state-of-the-art facilities at Jarrow Focus, Hebburn Central, The Word, Haven Point and Jarrow Pool.

This newly renovated leisure facility in Jarrow will open to the public in the new year.
